

THE SWEETWATER ARBORETUM AT ENGLEMAN PARK is a hidden gem, peacefully located off the beaten path. With a collection of over 30 specimens of notable tree species, some older than 150 years, this public city park offers free parking, a shaded pavilion, a gazebo, ADA accessible restroom facilities, and a children's playground designed with ages 2-5 in mind.

Residents and visitors are invited to explore this serene natural oasis and observe a wide diversity of Tennessee trees in a relatively compact area. The Arboretum is a resource for field trips and outdoor classes, as well as a

destination for old-fashioned family outings. The public is welcome to enjoy the facilities free of charge, including reserving the pavilions for reunions, showers, parties, and other group events throughout the year. (Call City Hall to reserve the pavilion, 423-337-6979.)








Engleman Park was purchased for \$640 in 1940 by the City of Sweetwater, which had passed an ordinance to establish a city park in 1936. The park area was covered with huge oak trees at the time. The park was named for J.G. (Major) Engleman, who served the City of Sweetwater as Recorder for 47 years, from 1918 until 1965.

A major renovation of Engleman Park was performed in 2010, adding the playground facilities and updating the pavilions and parking areas through the State of Tennessee LPRF grant program. In 2019, another LPRF grant added a splash pad, third pavilion, and swings. Sweetwater's full time parks and recreation staff maintains the property.

Many lifelong Sweetwater residents recall fond memories of childhood outings to Engleman Park for family picnics and gatherings. By establishing the Arboretum, the Sweetwater Tree Board hopes this urban forest will provide enjoyment now and to future generations.

The Sweetwater Tree Board's Mission Statement: We will serve as advocates for the health of the urban forest of Sweetwater by communicating with residents and business with regards to proper selection. planting, and maintenance of trees for now and for generations to come.
